TASKS – COMPLETE 1-6

1) Listen to this TED Talk:

Task: Write a list of discussion points/ questions it raises. Choose (at least) one of your questions and draft at least three possible answers. (300 - 500 words); typed or written on lined paper)

Task: Summarize the main ideas each video in no more than sentences. Make sure you include subheadings in your notes.

- 3) In Religious Studies, you will be introduced to many scholars to support arguments you make in your essays. For each one make notes on them as follows:
 - When were they alive?
 - ▶ What key books did they write?
 - What key issues they write about?
 - Are there any key quotes?
 - ▶ Do you find their work convincing?

- 4) Bonhoeffer research his Lite story and what he did because of his faith.

 Task: Create an A3 or A4 summary page in your own words using images and pictures to explain.
- 5) You will study theology as part of your A-level. For this, it is helpful to know the story of the person of Jesus.

To help with this, we recommend reading one of the Gospels (Matthew, Mark (shortest!), Luke, John) or watching The Miracle Maker film!

Optional Task: you may to create a timeline of Jesus' Life or print one off.

- 6) Create a collage of all the products and companies you use on a day to day basis; i.e. clothes, shoes, cosmetics, car, typical foods, phone, shops you use etc. Then Google:
 - where those companies are based (country)
 - where their products are produced (made)
 - how many are British?

Task: Conclude: how different would your life be if you could only eat food from Britain and products created In Britain. Is it fair that the poorest of people in the world in the poorest of conditions, make these nice products tor us for very little or no money?

Practise note-taking; write notes as you listen, just you would if you were listening to a real-life lecture, and practise the skill of jotting down key points at speed.

Ask yourself questions when you get end:

- → What were the speaker's key messages?
- → Do you agree with the speaker?
- → What might someone who disagreed say, and what might their reasons be?

How it links to the Specification / Skills:

- Introduction task: prepares you for September
- Tasks 1-2 link to the Philosophy of Religion (and reading)
- Task 3 links to all 3 disciplines
- Task 4-6 links to Theology (and reading)
- Task 7-9 links to Ethics (and reading)

Reading tasks are from a Key Stage 3 / 4 book – they provide a basic understanding for you.

Additional Information:

The worksheets you will need for Christianity is at the back of the pack, make sure you answer them in full sentences.

The other work needs to be completed on A4-A3 paper by hand and/or typed up on computer and needs to go into your folder. Therefore, anything on the computer needs to printed out.
