[Lord of the Flies: Ch 1 meeting the boys; Ch 5 discussing the 'beastie'; Ch 9 the death of Simon; final few pages]

Inspector Calls - the beginning and ending of each act

Or... watch summaries on YouTube

2. Learn the key content and ingredients:

- Make revision cards on the main characters using the 'five finger method'
- Make and learn a revision card for Social Context and BIG IDEAS and another for Methods

3. **Apply your knowledge** by mind-mapping key themes (eg responsibility or social class in Inspector Calls; human nature, fear or ideas about leadership and power in Lord of the Flies): What do we see across the text? How is it presented? Does it change? Why is it important?

How to revise the Power and Conflict Poetry

1. Know the poems as well as possible

- Read and re-read the poems
- Watch Mr Bruff's 5-minute revision videos on YouTube
- 2. Learn the key content and ingredients
- Make a revision card for each poem. Use MILES: methods/ideas/language (3 quotes will do) /emotions/structure plus any context you know

3. **Apply your knowledge** by creating mind maps that compare the poems: What are they suggesting about power or conflict? How is it presented? Why are the poets' choices important? Which poems are good to compare?
